

Disaster Deployment FAQ - WNC Flooding

1. When will I hear back about being placed to go?

We are experiencing an unprecedented response to the WNC flooding. We are a small staff working hard to place as many volunteers as our sites can hold. Thank you for being patient with us. If you are not placed at a time requested please keep later dates in mind. This response will be going on for weeks, months or even years.

2. What are the sleeping arrangements like?

You will be housed in a church. Please plan to bring your own TWIN cot or air mattress along with any needed linens. See attached packing list example to begin preparing.

3. What type of work will we be doing?

The needs we are seeing right now are chainsaw work, mud out, tear out, debris removal, etc. We ask all volunteers to be flexible and willing to do what work is needed while they serve on site. Needs are changing daily. We ask volunteers to be physically able to assist in these efforts.

4. What do I do when I arrive on site?

When you arrive on site please see the admin (or site coordinator) to sign your group in. Our Admin staff will give you further instructions.

5. How are the roads? How do I know the route to take?

You will be given a heads up on what we know about local roads. We are asking all volunteers to use <u>Drivenc.gov</u> to navigate road closures and alternate routes.

6. What if we get stopped on our way to the site?

You will have printed paperwork you can show. If you experience an issue while in route please call our office to notify us.

7. What if we want to bring donations (things) with us?

Right now our sites are inundated with supplies. As the need changes we will let groups know. If you have a large quantity of donations please contact Mark Abernathy in our office at <a href="mailto:mailto
